News

Parish Council Business

The October meeting was attended by representatives of Property Link of Watchfield who gave a presentation on a future proposed development on land off Combe Lane, Wedmore. Members agreed in principle to purchase a Speed Indicator Device (SID) for the village. These are the small signs that are moved around various locations and give drivers a flashing warning if they exceed the speed limit. As the signs are transportable, training will be given to one or two people so that good use is made of the equipment. This work used to be carried out by the County Council but has been dropped due to lack of funding. Members also agreed to budget for a new street lamp in Mudgley Road during the next financial year.

Members of neighbouring parishes recently met in Wedmore to discuss future funding for the 67 bus route. The County Transport officers are currently considering adding Burnham on Sea to the schedules and reinstating a Saturday service in and out of Wells. There would possibly be a 5% increase in fares announced soon.

Finally, on behalf of the Chairman and Members of the Council, may I wish you and your families a very Happy Christmas.

Wedmore Village Hall - 2018 AGM

Notice of the Annual General Meeting of the Wedmore Village Hall Management Committee – Thursday, 13 December 2018 at 6.00 pm in the Small Hall.

The Village Hall Management Committee have had another busy year continuing our endeavours to enhance the hall and make it ever more suitable for an extensive range of user groups. More than 25 user groups now use the hall on a regular basis from art to zumba; we have also been a venue of choice for a number of weddings. The hall continues to be a well-loved asset for the community.

As a Management Committee we are committed to pursuing a programme of maintenance and improvement but also to modernise and make this splendid Victorian building even more available, attractive and sustainable. Over the last twelve months we have had a new floor installed in the bar/snug area made possible by funding from the Real Ale Festival, installed retractable raked seating significantly enhancing

audience enjoyment – this was made possible by a £10,000 grant from Sedgemoor DC along with generous contributions from Wedmore Theatre, Wedmore Arts Festival and an advance of precept by Wedmore PC. All of the 51 seats have been sponsored by users within the community and a plaque is on each seat.

We have implemented an improved regular cleaning regime following a deep clean of the hall and the sanding of the main hall floor. I hope you have admired the 'new' floor which has been transformed from the grimy area it had become over the years. We were delighted to receive a grant from the Isle of Wedmore News and have consequently been able to replace items of the free-of-charge cutlery and crockery and can now provide over a hundred settings.

We have also been reassessed for Hallmark 1 and 2; this is the equivalent of Ofsted but for village halls and requires considerable preparation relating to Charity administration and management and numerous aspects of health, safety, security and licences.

Additionally, we have installed solar panels on the roof of the hall. Green Wedmore led the project and obtained all the funding to enable it to happen. It came from Wedmore Community Power Co-operative, Viridor Credits and Green Wedmore themselves. With a Tesla battery to store surplus generated electricity for use when the sun doesn't shine, throughout the summer we were largely self-sufficient and hardly drew any electricity from the grid – a great contribution to the environment and a significant cost saving.

We have ambitious plans but inevitably all these need to be funded. Our future projects include refurbishing the entrance lobby, revamping the bar area/snug to make it more welcoming, renovating the storage units in the main kitchen, redecorating the main hall, etc. The list is endless! At the same time we need to be cognisant of the need to maintain the fabric of the building – tiles, gutters, etc.

We are very grateful to all our sponsors and users for the success of the hall. I hope that many of our user groups will send a representative to the AGM on Thursday, 13 December, along with any residents of Wedmore, and let us know of your needs and wishes for the Hall.

Love Fresh Veg?


Have you ever thought about growing your own fruit and vegetables?

Ethel Pople Deceased Charity and the Wedmore Charities

The late Ethel Pople, formerly of The Old Smithy, Cocklake, Wedmore, who died in 1978, left a trust under her will for the assistance of the elderly and/or infirm of Cocklake, Clewer and Wedmore to be called 'The Ethel Pople Trust' in honour of 'Our Blessed Lady of Wedmore'. Every year, those who think they may qualify are invited to apply.

The trustees of the Wedmore Charities, an entirely separate trust, also make annual distributions of trust income, predominantly to those within the parish who fall within the same definition, in other words, the elderly and/or infirm.

The trustees of both charities meet in December each year with a view to deciding how their combined distributions can be applied for the greater benefit of those entitled each year.

The trustees of both the Ethel Pople Trust and the Wedmore Charities therefore invite written applications from those who qualify under the terms of these trusts with a view to distribution of the trust income in December 2018. Letters should state briefly the basis on which the applicants qualify, i.e. whether by a reason of age or infirmity and with any other relevant information as to the applicants' circumstances that they feel able to give.

Please note that if you have applied successfully before the trustees would like you to provide written confirmation that your circumstances have not changed.

The trustees of both charities will consider applications early in December with a view to distribution of trust income before Christmas.

St Mary's Church, Wedmore Joins the Toilet Twinning Revo-loo-tion


As part of Wedmore's efforts to become a 'Toilet Twinned Village' St Mary's Church now boasts certificates to show that they are supporting others across the globe.

The charity Toilet Twinning help to provide clean water, basic sanitation and hygiene education in some of the world's poorest countries. Poor sanitation is one of the world's biggest killers and every minute a child under the age of five dies because of dirty water or lack of sanitation. The charity tackles this crisis through a twinning scheme which funds materials and education to empower people to build their own toilets and learn about the importance of hygiene and clean water.

Revd Richard Neill, Vicar of St Mary's, said 'It is outrageous that so many people in the world still lack the sanitation which we just take for granted. Toilet Twinning is such

a simple but imaginative way of tackling this problem and St Mary's are delighted to have twinned our church toilets with a church toilet block in Zambia. It is particularly good that a church in Zambia will be the beneficiary as the diocese of Bath and Wells has been 'twinned' with the Anglican Church in Zambia for the last 40 years.'

Local church-goers and villagers have helped raise the funds at St Mary's monthly Fair Trade coffee mornings, along with a generous donation from the church themselves. Liz Burton, who has been leading the local fundraising, says 'as well as individuals having the option to twin their home toilets for just £60, larger organisations such as businesses, churches and schools can raise money to sponsor a whole block of toilets. I'm delighted that St Mary's has got on board with this initiative and have become the latest toilet twinners in Wedmore.'





Sedgemoor intend to appoint an Examiner in January who will consider the plan and report back with any changes required. Hopefully, this will be completed by March 2019.

All being well, we will then be in a position to hold the Referendum on the Plan on 2 May 2019 (the same day as the local elections).

National Report Rates Musgrove Park's Maternity and Neonatal Care Above National Average

Mothers who deliver their baby early and need additional care at Musgrove Park Hospital's neonatal unit have better outcomes than most of England. According to a report by the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health into neonatal care, Musgrove performs better than the national average.

The report says 7 in 10 premature babies discharged from the hospital's neonatal unit are breastfed, compared with six in ten nationally. This is thanks to a great focus by neonatal staff, who work with Musgrove's specialist infant feeding team to teach and support mums to breastfeed.

Another area where Musgrove Park performs above the national average is in cases of bloodstream infections (sepsis) in babies receiving intensive care. There were none at Musgrove in the last year, compared with a national average of 5.6 in 1,000.

This is in part due to enhanced care available on the neonatal unit over the last few years where it's now mandatory for two clinicians to be present when intravenous lines are placed in babies.

At Musgrove's neonatal unit, nine in ten parents are present with their baby during a consultant ward round, compared with 75 per cent nationally. Parents are encouraged to be present during a ward round so they get a chance to let their consultant know first-hand if anything is concerning them.



Tidying through some old documents recently, I came across a booklet entitled 'Bagley Close Magazine December 1938,' although for the life of me I can't remember how it originally came into my possession.



An entry from one of those I knew really appealed to me, and I copy it below.

I love to see the lovely rolling sea of blue and green and to watch the sea-gulls flying round to try to find some dainty bite upon the ground. The sun shines on the beach and gradually the sea comes rolling in on the golden sand and covers the shining beach.

Slowly the sun goes down over the sea and makes a beautiful colour in the sky. Then when it grows colder I go home because the sea comes up over the sand.

I thought it was a lovely little piece from a young boy, and remember Clive Higgs and his BSA 250cc motor-bike. Sadly he was killed on it when in his twenties, I believe at Yarley Cross.

Two other names in the booklet I recognised were Clifford Bethel, Class 1, and Cecil Sugg, Class 3. I also well remember the Headmaster, George Parfitt, who was there in 1954, although I don't know whether he was there in 1938.

It is also poignant to remember the terrible events which were set to ensue the following year when Europe erupted into war, of which in December 1938 the young pupils would have no fore-knowledge.

RNLI - News and Local Rescues in September

On Saturday 20 October RNLI Winscombe held their Sponsored Fire Walk in front of Winscombe Cricket Club when 18 volunteers walked barefoot over a bed of red hot wood embers in front of



a crowd of 300 spectators. The committed sponsorship total now exceeds £5,000.

There were 10 local rescues in October – (Minehead – 5, Portishead – 2, Weston-Super-Mare - 3). On 19 October, Minehead's D class lifeboat was launched just after mid-day to search for a couple cut off by the tide on a boulder-strewn beach. They located the couple at Selworthy Sands, took them off the beach and landed them back at Minehead; this rescue is recorded on video on the RNLI Minehead Lifeboat Station web page.

Isle of Wedmore Society - Report of 25 October Meeting

Due to our advertised Speaker having to cancel his talk the Society was lucky enough to contact Ian Piper from The Yeovil Free-Wheelers, a voluntary organisation of Blood Bikers, who deliver blood and other medical items to hospitals and private homes.

Ian, who turned up with his very expensive and specially adapted BMW motorbike, gave an amusing and



very interesting talk about this vital work. The Yeovil branch of the Blood Bikers, who are celebrating their 40th anniversary this year, mainly work out of Yeovil District Hospital delivering items during out of hours all over the south west and beyond, including London.

The idea started in 1962 to get young motor cyclists off the street and into using their bikes for something useful.

Yeovil operate four bikes with 40 volunteers, who are highly trained and are able to use sirens and blue lights when on a call but must not break any motoring laws, including speeding or jumping red traffic lights.

The bikes can cost anything up to about £16-17,000 each and annual running costs are £7,500 per bike - the volunteers save the NHS about £100,000 per year and are mainly supported by donations.

The volunteers started out doing 15 jobs in the first year but now carry out 1,000 call-outs per annum. The Society is very grateful that Ian could come and talk to us at very short notice and if the number of questions was anything to go by then we had a very worthwhile evening.

Mendip Rotary Club Marks World Polio Day



Members of the Rotary Club of Mendip were marking World Polio Day by planting purple crocus bulbs opposite Cheddar War Memorial. The 'Purple for Polio Campaign' aims to raise public awareness of the life-threatening infectious disease of poliomyelitis which, although eradicated in the UK in 1984, still affects children in developing countries.

Mendip Rotarians also organised a public display in Cheddar library, where Rotarian Bob Acland gave an informative talk to members of the public about Rotary's progress towards eliminating the disease. Rotary Clubs worldwide have been actively fund-raising since 1985, and working with the World Health Organisation to provide vaccination against the disease.

Cases due to wild poliovirus have decreased by over 99% since 1988, from an estimated 350,000 cases then to 22 reported cases in 2017. As a result of the global effort to eradicate the disease, more than 16 million people have been saved from

paralysis. The latest statistics show that reported cases so far this year have dropped to fewer than 15, but as long as a single child remains infected, children in all countries are at risk of contracting the disease.





Tasty Morsels – Recipes for You



Bubble and Squeak Frittata

Christmas is coming, so a feast of good food. It always seems to be the case that we eat too much, but nevertheless have mountains of food left over. Well here is an idea of what to do – make a frittata. Left over scraps can be made into a substantial meal and you can add almost anything you like. The recipe is a basic frittata, and then add what you have; be it ham, bacon, sausages or various cheeses, etc. Whatever you add, it's good to have some grated hard cheese on the top.

Serve with salad items which are still lurking in the fridge and those half empty bottles of wine which need finishing off!

Ingredients (serves four)

2 tbsp olive oil

1 large onion, sliced

8 eggs

Salt and ground pepper

300/400g cold cooked potatoes cut into cubes

300/400g cold cooked cabbage or other left over greens, shredded

1 tbsp chopped mixed herbs

75g grated hard cheese

Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan, and then add the onions. Cook gently for 10 minutes until soft and golden.
- 2. Meanwhile, break the eggs into a jug, beat lightly and season well.
- 3. Add the potatoes to the onions and cook gently for a few minutes to heat through, then stir in the greens and herbs, and whatever else you choose.
- 4. Add some more seasoning and make sure the ingredients are well combined and evenly distributed around the pan right up to the edges, then pour in the eggs.
- 5. Keep the heat low, do not move the ingredients around; just let the egg slowly set from the bottom up. After 6-7 minutes give the pan a shake. You should be able to see that the bottom half of the frittata is set, but there is still a good layer of wet egg on top.
- 6. Now sprinkle the cheese on top and place the pan under a hot grill. You want the frittata to finish cooking slowly so keep the grill heat moderate. Leave the frittata for 10 minutes or so until the top is set and golden brown.
- 7. Now let it cool in the pan for 10 minutes, and then transfer to a serving dish.

The Garden in December

I am writing this on 31 October. We have already had several cold nights this autumn, although, here in Theale, not quite as cold as forecast. A couple of nights ago however, it went down to -2° C. or maybe even lower (I didn't look until 6.00 am) and that was enough to blacken dahlia foliage and finish off our outdoor tomatoes.



I have seen predictions of an exceptionally cold winter, but I don't know how scientific they are. I said last month that I might try to come up with a Christmas Gardening crossword, but although I have started it, I won't make the deadline if I try to complete it, so it will have to be a New Year crossword!

If these present low temperatures persist into December, they will do significant damage to all half-hardy plants not only dahlias. Gladioli, begonias and any other similarly tender species that may be on the patio or in containers elsewhere need to be moved. If you have somewhere protected to put them, such as a cold greenhouse, then do so. If not then cover them with fleece or similar protection. However, by the time you are reading this, this cold snap may be history; in recent years we have tended to have a few frosts in November, followed by a return to mild, damp weather, so we shall see. As I said last month, mild, damp conditions in winter can be ideal for the spread of grey-mould fungus (botrytis) which attacks a wide range of plants, particularly when there is little air movement, so under glass, open ventilators and/or have a fan to circulate the air. Winter bedding plants, such as pansies and primulas can also suffer from this mould, so beware. There used to be various fungicides available to amateur gardeners to counteract this problem, but most of them are no longer available so you will just have to be vigilant and pick off any affected foliage that you see.

Winter vegetables, such as lettuce, under glass or polythene, can be affected by the same problem; getting the foliage too wet when watering can make it worse, so try using "leaky hose" for example, rather than overhead watering.

I was speaking to someone a few days ago who said that, so far, the birds have not been stripping berries from pyracanthas, cotoneasters, etc. No doubt they will when the weather gets colder; they always take the red berries first, because birds can see better at the red end of the spectrum (incidentally, that is why slug pellets are blue, so that birds don't see them on the ground and eat them and flowers pollinated by birds in the wild e.g. hummingbirds, tend to be red). This is not irrelevant as it leads me on to preserving holly berries for Christmas; if you wish to do this on a tree in your garden, putting a polythene bag over them, tied loosely, can keep our feathered friends off until you want to use the holly for festive displays.

When the leaves have all come off you can prune apples and pears at any time until the buds begin to burst again at about the end of February. Do not, however,

prune plum or cherry trees in the winter, as this lays them open to infection by the silver-leaf disease, which is at best debilitating and at worst, lethal. (I'm sure I say that every year).

On the lawn, now is a good time to deal with moss, either chemically or simply by raking - a good job on a cold day - but remember that moss in a lawn is often a symptom of some other problem. Poor drainage, shade or acidity may be to blame and the cause needs to be addressed otherwise it will simply return next year. Frequently, scalped patches appear at the side of the lawn where the mower wheels have dropped off the edge, or herbaceous plants have flopped on to it. Use the lawn edger to cut out a piece of turf and turn it around, so that the grassy part is moved to the edge, the bald bit will then be filled in by encroachment of grass from the surrounding area. If you frequently have problems with border plants lying on the lawn, consider a "mowing strip" of slabs along the edge of the grass, sunk in to turf level so that the mower passes over them. I have often considered putting a "swath board" on the mower so that it pushes such plants to one side (the border) instead of running over them. Come on mower manufacturers, take the hint!

If you like to have some scent in the garden in winter, consider growing sarcococca confusa, sometimes known as Christmas Box; it is evergreen and has small creamy, honey-scented flowers. It grows to about a metre high and wide and usually flowers early in the New Year.

Talking of Christmas Boxes, it is now time to drop hints about gardening books or other related items that you would like to find in your Christmas stocking, Also, get together a selection of seed and other gardening catalogues, so that you have an excuse to sit in the arm-chair and browse through them during the short days of midwinter (with a warming drink of something to help).



Often at carol services the last reading that we hear is from the gospel, the account of Jesus' life, given by John. He begins his account at the beginning of time and speaks about the light and life that Jesus brings to all creation,

'In him was life; and the life was the light of men. And the light shines in the darkness; and the darkness did not overcome it.'

That light is God's good gift to us, an assurance of his presence with those who find themselves in dark places, full of sadness, pain, loneliness and emptiness. And at Christmas we remember especially that this gift of light is seen most fully in Jesus.

Enjoy the lights this Christmas, keep them shining for as long as possible; and remember that the great light which all our decorations celebrate and to which they point will continue to shine long after the twinkling Christmas trees and neon Santas have been put away for another year.

Lisa, Iona, Melissa and I thank you for all your good wishes and prayers this year. May you have a Christmas full of light and a New Year full of hope.

Coaching is available all year round and bookings are now being taken for January 2019.


