This copy of your Isle of Wedmore News comes to you thanks to a team of local volunteers, who between them deliver 1750 copies of our magazine to almost every house in Wedmore and the surrounding villages and hamlets.

Eventually people move onto other things, and we need quickly to find other volunteers to cover the rounds. In order to do this we keep a reserve list of those people who would be interested in doing so but our list is, once again, depleted and we are now looking at replenishing it.

Distributors receive a payment to cover their expenses, and the amount varies depending on the number of magazines delivered. From £10 to £20 per month for between 50 and 220 magazines, with most distributors receiving £15.

You must be over 14 to have a round, however you are welcome to add your name to the waiting list prior to turning 14, as there could be a wait before anything becomes available.

I hope you've had a wonderful summer. I've enjoyed meeting so many of you at local events and my surgeries across the patch. Thank you if you came to say hello, share your views and ask questions.

My month started with a wonderful reunion supper hosted by Alan and Theresa, with Mireille and Christian, who were here to mark Wedmore's 50 years of twinning with St Medard. It was lovely to catch up, and at a time when often differences are highlighted, it's great to recognise how shared values enrich our lives and are in themselves a cause for celebration.

Next were Wedmore and Blackford Harvest Homes, celebrating food, farming and our rural way of life, and then Trotterfest with some great bands! Thank you to all the organisers of these special occasions, and it's brilliant to see so many people enjoying themselves.

I hosted my first 'youth' surgeries this summer and it was so interesting to hear from young people about their hopes and concerns. It is likely that today's 12-year-olds and upwards will be able to vote at the next General Election and it's good to know what the next generation really cares about.

In my last update, I shared my concerns about waterway maintenance and future flooding in Somerset. In August, I attended the South West Association of Drainage Authorities (SWADA) emergency meeting about the situation with the Environment Agency and when Parliament returned in early September, I requested Ministerial intervention. I also updated your Parish Council at its August meeting.

It has been great this summer to visit some excellent local charities and organisations, including Prickles Hedgehog Rescue, Somerset Armed Forces Cadets, Somerset Wildlife Trust and others. There is so much going on and it's a real privilege to recognise the efforts of those who volunteer, support and take responsibility for so much activity locally.

That said, I am only too aware of the challenges many face here. For many of us, the closest hospital can be many miles away and big changes are afoot. I attended the committee meeting when community hospital bed closures were discussed and have had further discussions with NHS Leaders, seeking reassurance that patients and carers will receive improved services at the time changes are made, rather than relying on promises that more will come 'soon'.

Outside my 'patch', I met the specialists at the Royal Marsden Hospital working with the latest Radiotherapy machines. Many of you will know I've pressed the Government for many years on the availability of up-to-date machines in the NHS.

Wedmore Parish Clerk Update

Hello Friends. October is one of those in-between months. Summer is behind us, the clocks are about to change, and winter is just around the corner with the start of the darker evenings, a gentle reminder to check your bike lights, wear something reflective, and keep hedges and verges trimmed for road safety. While many of us are digging out coats and lighting fires a little earlier in the evening, your Parish Council has been making sure Wedmore is ready for what the next season may bring.

At our August Full Council meeting, we kept the basics ticking along; approving payments; updating policies; and agreeing to bring in a Locum Responsible Financial Officer so I'm not spread too thin as we head into budget season. Over in Planning, councillors have been weighing up applications, supporting those that made sense for our parish and pushing back where designs felt wrong for our landscape or where agricultural need didn't really add up. These may sound a little dry, but they're the kind of choices that shape Wedmore for years to come.

We also approved five new heritage-style village entry signs as part of the King Alfred Project. These will mark the gateways into the parish with a nod to our history and identity, a small but significant way of celebrating what makes Wedmore special.

The real focus right now, though, is community resilience. Winter floods, power cuts, storms, none of these are new to us, but we're determined to be better prepared. Thanks to a grant from Somerset Prepared, we're buying practical kit: high-capacity water pumps; flood barriers; protective clothing; and Public Access Bleed Control Kits. These will be phased in across the parish, starting near defibrillators and higher-risk areas. In a rural community, many of us work hands-on, on farms, with machinery, or in more isolated places. We all hope these kits are never needed, but it's reassuring to know they're there.

We're also carrying out pre-winter checks on local watercourses. Quotations are being sought for light-touch vegetation clearance, and councillors are compiling a list of other trouble spots. This is where your knowledge is invaluable: if you know of a gully, ditch, or stretch of brook that regularly backs up, please tell us.

Of course, resilience isn't just about kit or inspections, it's about people. We're building a network of volunteers who can lend a hand when needed. That might mean

first aid training, checking drains, or being available with a 4x4 in poor weather. You don't have to commit to anything heavy; just letting us know you're willing makes a difference.

How you can help this month:

- Report any blocked drains or culverts.
- Put your name down as a potential resilience volunteer (no obligation).
- Keep verges and hedges trimmed, visibility matters as the nights draw in!

Your Council is doing the groundwork, but it's our shared effort that makes Wedmore strong. Thank you for offering your time and for helping keep our parish a safe, welcoming place to call home.

Friends Conquer Three Peaks in 24 hours

In memory of their school friend Adam Stimpson, who died of a Brain Tumour aged 20, eleven friends and former pupils of Kings of Wessex took on an extraordinary challenge

to complete the legendary Three Peaks Challenge, scaling Ben Nevis, Scafell Pike, and Snowdon within 24 hours. Their efforts raised an incredible £6,250 for The Brain Tumour Charity, supporting vital research into a disease that has affected so many lives.

The team—Ed Martin, Ted Hacker, Alex Cave Calland, Ben Hemingway-Arnold, Beppe Degregorio, Sam Floyd, Kearn Shah, Louis Norman, Stan Boorman, James Norman, and Robin Bridgman—set offearly in the morning and

powered through 1,300 miles of travel, brutal weather, thunderstorms, sickness, sleep deprivation, and sheer exhaustion to complete the challenge with just 15 minutes to spare. After a 500+ mile minibus journey the day before, their climb began at 6.00 am at the foot of Ben Nevis. High spirits and determination helped them shave 30 minutes off their predicted time.

But the real test came at Scafell Pike, where hailstorms, slippery tracks, and freezing temperatures pushed the team to their limits. Despite falling behind schedule, they conquered the peak in just 2 hours and 30 minutes—an effort that ultimately saved the mission. Soaking wet, they embarked on a four-hour drive to Snowdon, where

The place is St Mary's, Wedmore with its brand-new seating, the time is 7.15 pm. The date is Wednesday 8 October and it's the opening night of Wedmore Opera's new production of the Wedmore opera world's most popular opera, Giuseppe Verdi's La Traviata.



First performed in 1853, Wedmore's new production sets the story in the present day. The main character, Violetta, lives a life of luxury in Paris as mistress to Baron Duphol, but has never experienced love. Then along comes Alfredo and turns her world upside down. The couple escape to the countryside, until Alfredo's disapproving father intervenes and Violetta is forced to make a heartbreaking choice. What happens next? Come and find out.

This is a great first opera, sung in English, and one you can enjoy over and over again. 



Method -

Preheat the oven to 160C. Pulse the biscuits in a food processor until crumbed, then add in the 3 tbsp sugar and melted butter. Combine well. If you do not have a food processor, put the biscuits in a plastic food bag and crush using a rolling pin, then combine with the butter and sugar. Press the mixture into the bottom of a 25cm springform pan. Use the back of a spoon to press down and ensure the crust is an even layer. Set aside.

In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese, sugar, and vanilla with an electric mixer until blended. Add the eggs, one at a time, on low speed until blended. Pour over the digestive crust.

Bake for 55 minutes or until the centre is about set. Cool to room temperature, then refrigerate at least 4 hours before serving. Run a knife along the edges of pan, then unlock the springform to remove and serve with fresh berries. Enjoy

This Month in the Garden

As I am writing this, the most welcome, and torrential, rain is descending from dark grey clouds, so I hope that when you are reading this, we are not being flooded by the latest version of climate change. The lawns have changed colour now back to green and in dry spells will need mowing, perhaps raising the cutting height to help them recover from that momentous drought of June, July and August. The finest lawns will probably need raking to tease out moss, but lawn experts will apply a moss killer first otherwise you will just be propagating the moss. Moss is just a symptom of poor nutrition and poor surface drainage so there's another job for the real lawn lover.

Light levels are now superb for photographs, and the autumn colour from trees and shrubs is superb, if a little earlier this year because of that summer drought. Visit Westonbirt Arboretum near Tetbury, Gloucestershire if you can and be amazed at the autumn colour on show particularly from the Japanese maples (Acers). We always used to take the horticulture students from Cannington on a trip there every October and Jean and I would usually fit in an additional visit, returning with one or two, or more, young trees from the sales area. Wonderful times.

Down on the allotment, there should be lots to harvest with courgettes lettuce, beans, onions, beetroot, carrots and potatoes all ready to gather. Celeriac can be left for another month or two and parsnips also as they will sweeten with any frost. Cut pumpkins with a long stalk and finish ripening under cover. We harvested 35 to 40 Butternut fruits when we lived in Devon, and Jean used to make the most delicious soup well into February and March.

This is probably the very best month for planting new trees. For small gardens don't forget the fastigiate (narrow) varieties including Malus 'Laura' AGM. Actually, most of the crab apples would be an excellent choice, prolific in flower and fruit ('M. John Downie' the best) and most efficient at pollinating local apple trees. In the Prunus (flowering cherry tree) genus P. amanogawa is a natural choice with prolific scented pink flowers and good autumn leaf colour. Prunus 'Kanzan' would be my choice for a traditional (but broad) variety but there are many more available.

It is also bulb time of course, so firstly lift and store gladioli and begonia tubers. Dahlias will need some attention now. Traditional treatment would be to lift them after cutting down the stems to a few inches. Wash off all the soil from the tubers and then turn them upside down and leave to dry out completely. Once this is done, they can be stored frost-free wrapped in newspaper or in trays or pots of dry compost until next spring. Recent trends, particularly on well drained soils, is to leave the tubers in the ground but mulched with a thick layer of coarse bark or compost. That sounds an easier strategy these days but if we get heavy frosts on heavy clay soils, we will probably lose the tubers. It's also time to buy and plant spring bulbs, especially daffodils, as soon as possible now. Most other bulbs can be planted but leave tulips until November. Spare tubs can be planted now in layers with the top decorated with a conifer or other evergreen plant - a good reason for another visit to the nursery / garden centre.

Plant some hyacinth bulbs in bowls but keep in the dark for a few weeks until green shoots appear then bring out to flower for Christmas. Outside, empty the compost bins to top-dress borders and then they'll be ready to be refilled with the autumn cut down stems and late cut grass. Perhaps best left to churchyards, but the wood makes excellent longbows, gates, and flooring. Happy Gardening!

When I was a child, a Sunday School teacher in the old tin chapel at Bagley, Mrs Libby Tinknell, asked me to learn and recite Isaiah chapter 55 for the Sunday School Anniversary. I have since encouraged children at today's Bagley Church to do the same, as that particular chapter has been a blessing to me over the years.

Isaiah 55 verse 6 and 7 – 'Seek the Lord while he may be found, call on him while he is near. Let the wicked forsake his way and the evil man his thoughts. Let him turn to the Lord and he will have mercy on him and to our God for he will freely pardon.'

Freely Pardon? What about justice? Even in our justice system if someone pleads guilty, they still go to prison.



Could you please pass on my thanks to the people who put the V.E. on the Wedmore Village Hall wall. Visiting a very old friend, she told me how well she remembers the Day, jumping up and down shouting 'my daddy is coming home!'

Dear Editor,

I was very interested in the article on 'A Wartime Haven in Wedmore' and it added a little more to our village history. However, the German plane did not crash in woods near Hove College, Elmsett Hall.

In July 1995 I wrote the following article in the Isle of Wedmore News on Wedmore in Wartime, 1939-1945. The account of the crash was given to me by several villagers who had witnessed it and even captured the escaping Germans who had survived.

'On 27 March 1944 a German bomber, a Junkers Ju88A-4, crashed in Tadham Moor. The plane was reportedly shot down by anti-aircraft fire from Weston-super-Mare. As it flew, in trouble, over the village the crew ditched some items to try and keep it flying. It was said that canisters, bomb doors and other things were dropped but no bombs. Some of the bits landed in the grounds of The Hall, in Sand Road, and one piece was said to have been the gun turret. Before the plane ditched, the four crew members bailed out. The parachute of the wireless operator Heinrich Schink failed to open, and he was found dead in the moor the next day. He was buried in Ashcombe Road Cemetery, Weston-super-Mare. The remaining crew members were captured making their various ways to the coast.'

The Sweet family dug out pieces of the plane in Tadham Moor, but the engines were buried too deep and are still there. Some of the remains of the plane can be seen at Sweets Tea Shop and Museum. The full account of the crash is in my book, The New Wedmore Chronicles, available in Wedmore Village Store or from me.

Our Health and Wellbeing

In consultation with Axbridge and Wedmore Medical Practice and with the support of Wedmore Parish Council, here is this month's item relating to our health and wellbeing. Firstly, thank you to Pauline Helsop, Eileen Gillibrand and Eileen Wotton for writing the Health and Wellbeing items for August and September. They were both excellent articles!

Reliable, relevant, accurate and easy to read information on the internet – is there such a thing?

Yes, there is, but it is not always easy to find! Some sources look legitimate but may not be. The NHS App and website are key sources of information you can trust about health and wellbeing. For locally produced information, try this website which has been developed by NHS Dietitians in Somerset. There are webinars providing information on some health conditions, mainly related to nutrition at www.



patientwebinars.co.uk Also I have recently found this source of reliable information – Patient.info. It is also available in an App – Patient Access. If you use the NHS App and have a login, you can link the two Apps. Patient Access states that it has 'Health information you can trust. Our clinical information meets NHS England's Information Standard'. For example, you can check whether you are eligible for a Flu and/or COVID vaccination this Autumn and then book with you GP Practice (if your Practice is linked), all on the same App – very easy!

The range of information is infinite, from menopause to meningitis, pleurisy to pacemakers. It is written in an easy-to-read accessible format. One of the benefits of this App and website is that it is up to date and provides the latest health news, for example, tips on how to increase your Vitamin D intake during the winter months when the sun is illusive, see www.patient.info/news-and-features/how-to-boost-your-vitamin-d-levels-this-winter Also it recently reported about the change in NICE Guidance for treating Type 2 Diabetes. www.patient.info/news-and-features/changes-in-type-2-diabetes-care-what-it-means-for-you The change in approach is moving beyond simply managing blood sugar to taking a holistic view of a person's health, particularly their cardiovascular and kidney health.

The NHS app and website at www.patient.info also have a number of trusted tools and calculators to help you assess your health status, for example, a symptom checker and the Epworth sleepiness scale. These tools are designed to support your health journey.

According to Patient Access 'Exercise should form part of our day-to-day lives'. This is not a new message! There is also good evidence to show that making a change in your regular exercise type can be beneficial, see www.patient.info/news-and-features/the-benefits-of-switching-up-your-exercise. Maybe you take your exercise alone, but how about taking part in a group and socialise with like-minded people for an added dimension? For example, there is the Sharpham Road Playing Fields Park Run every Saturday at 9am. For more information go to www.parkrun.org.uk/sharphamroadplayingfields This is a free, fun, and friendly weekly 5k community event. Walk, jog, run, volunteer or spectate – it's up to you! The report of the August Bank Holiday run talked of participants 'kicking up dust'. As we go into the Autumn, with cooler and wetter weather, I guess there may be mud to be 'kicked up', but I'm sure the sense of achievement will still be as great at the end of 5K, the benefit of the exercise will still be felt, and you may have made some new friends!



Cheddar and Wedmore Bridge Club

Notable scores of 65% or more were achieved in July club sessions by Jane Hall and Peter Dawes (69.6%), Chris Bryant and Mike Smith (67.5%), Brian Crosby and Mike Smith (66.3% and 66%), Barbara Biggin and Mike Smith (65.5%), Maria Constantinidou and Derek Essen (65%) and Janice Young and Ronnie Follenfant (65%).

Steve Pedrick contributed this month's hand (prior to his hip operation which we hear has gone well). It is an unusual hand in that a small slam was bid and made at every table, but Esme and Steve scored a complete top thanks to Esme's decision to play in 6 no trumps rather than the 6 hearts contract played at every other table.



With North the dealer the bidding went 1S – 2H – 4H – 4NT (Blackwood) – 5D (1 ace). Esme then bid 6NT not 6H and the extra 10 points alone ensured a top since all the other tables played in 6H making 12 tricks when the Queen of hearts did not drop. Esme finessed against the Queen, however, and made all 13 tricks!

Note how close these hands are to making a grand slam. Playing Roman Key Card Blackwood, North would bid 5H to show two key cards missing the Queen and 5NT would get 6H response showing 2 kings, so you know you have all the aces and kings but not the Queen of hearts. Partner's 1S - 4H bids suggests about 16 points, so they have

more high cards than they have shown.

Everything is suggesting that a grand slam depends upon not losing to the queen of hearts, but you don't know if partner has three or four hearts and whether or not they have the Jack so it's difficult to estimate your probability of success. Even if you knew for certain that it was a 50% probability, however, should you bid the grand? I'm afraid that at club level you should not since it is extremely rare to find everyone bidding at least a small slam. There will usually be some people only playing in game so bidding and making a small slam will score more than 50%. There were 6 tables on the night in question. Suppose one table made 4H +2 for a bottom when 5 tables bid and made 6H. They would all score 60%. By bidding the grand you are risking losing 60% for the chance of gaining 40%. If two tables failed to bid the small slam, then you would risk losing 70% for the chance of gaining 30%. You can see that you need much better than a 50% chance to gain in the long run.

Wedmore Footpaths Group – Walking with Secateurs

Walking the footpaths around Wedmore is a brilliant way to really appreciate the beautiful place in which we live, but it can sometimes present some unexpected obstacles. Not least, those dreaded brambles! Growing amazingly fast, they must surely have been one of the key obstacles to Prince Charming ever reaching the Sleeping Beauty and their spiky stems can quickly block routes, snag clothing and make access difficult.

So a top-tip to all, in addition to abiding by the Countryside Code, is to always carry a pair of secateurs with you to help keep footpaths, gateways, and hedgerows clear. Overhanging brambles can make a walk unpleasant or even hazardous and a quick snip here and there can make a lot of difference and make the path easier for the next walker, cyclist or rider. Cutting back brambles gives light and space to other wildflowers and shrubs and will encourage plant diversity



You will need a sharp, sturdy, pair of secateurs to make clean cuts and reduce strain; a pair of strong gardening gloves, essential for protection against thorns; sturdy footwear for walking on uneven ground; and, optionally, a bag to carry off any longer trimmings if they fall directly onto the path.

How to do it safely. Focus on the path and only cut back what is blocking access. Leave the main bramble clumps intact, as they provide food and shelter for wildlife; cut at the base of new shoots, snip the canes close to the ground or back to the hedge line to slow regrowth; clear as you go by moving cut stems to the side of the path where they won't trip anyone

or block gateways; avoid over-clearing as brambles are valuable for birds, insects and mammals. Trim lightly rather than stripping whole areas; finally, stay mindful of land ownership, stick to public rights of way, and avoid heavy cutting on private property unless you have permission.

Best times to trim. Spring to early summer, when new shoots start crossing paths; and late summer to autumn, after the berries are finished, to keep paths clear through winter.

The result is that, by the end of a walk with secateurs, the paths are clearer, safer, and more visible. It's a small action that combines exercise, care for the countryside and help for fellow walkers, making a big contribution to maintaining open, safe, and welcoming paths for all.





Royal Air Forces Association Mid-Somerset Branch

At the September Branch meeting Dave Rogers, an Observer Lieutenant based in Yeovil, supported by his wife Julia, gave a presentation 'The History of the Royal Observer Corps'. The presentation covered the role of the police in WW1 as aircraft observers that led to the introduction







task of detecting and reporting nuclear explosions and associated fall-out. In 1965, the ROC lost its role in Air Defence and assumed the role of field force for the United Kingdom Warning and Monitoring Organisation (UKWMO) related to its nuclear reporting role This continued until the ROC was stood down in March 1996, at the end of the Cold War. Dave Rogers was an Observer Lieutenant based in Yeovil

On 14 September the Branch commemorated the 85th Anniversary of the Battle of Britain with a Multi-Denomination Battle of Britain Service that remembered the activity, personnel and service of the RAF during WW2 and subsequent conflicts. The Service was attended by the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Somerset, Mayors and local dignitaries, representatives from RAFA Yeovil Branch and Air Cadets from Shepton Mallet and Wells Squadrons; Wreaths were then laid at the Shepton Mallet Cenotaph.

Wedmore Community Bus

The Community bus is a not-for-profit bus service run by volunteers for the benefit of the local community. It currently provides regular weekly scheduled services to four locations and monthly services to Bath and Cribbs Causeway. The bus is also available for Private Hire, principally for the use of local community groups.



Scheduled Services

There are four Scheduled Services a week. These are:

Taunton – Tuesday Bridgwater – Wednesday Weston-super-Mare – Thursday Street and Glastonbury – Friday

In addition, there are the following monthly services:

Bath – first Monday of every month (except Bank Holidays) **Cribbs Causeway** – some Mondays

The bus departs from Wedmore Car Park at The Lerburne at around 9.30 am to start picking up passengers. It returns to Wedmore between 1.30 pm and 3.30 pm depending on the destination. See below for more details.

The bus is a friendly place where there is normally a happy buzz of conversation. Our passengers often meet for a coffee whilst at the destination.

Anyone is welcome to come on the bus, and a place can easily be booked by telephone.

Except for the Bath service, we try to pick up and drop off at the homes of all users who need this. For other passengers this will be at a location that is convenient for them. We are also flexible about drop offs on route.

We are happy to provide help in getting on and off the bus for those who need it.

Drivers are all volunteers who want to help passengers to enjoy their time on the bus as much as possible.

Except for the Bath and Cribbs Causeway services, the service is free for everyone with a Concessionary Bus Pass. All services are free for children under 5 years old. For other passengers fares are low, as the bus is financed by Somerset Council and drivers are volunteers.

Bath and Cribbs Causeway services are £2 for Concessions.

Timetable and Booking Details

All services – Depart Wedmore Car Park at The Lerburne at around 9.30 am to start picking up passengers. Note that the new Bath Service will only pick up at Wedmore Car Park and Theale.

Tuesday - Taunton – Departs Taunton 2.00 pm, back around 2.45 pm.

Wednesday - Bridgwater - Departs Bridgwater 1.00 pm, back around 2.00 pm.

Thursday - Weston-super-Mare – Departs Weston 1.45 pm, back around 2.45 pm.

Friday - Street and Glastonbury - Departs Street 1.00 pm, back around 1.30 pm.

Bath – This month's visit to Bath will be on Monday 6 October. Passengers must pre-book and not just turn up in the car park for this service. Please note that this service does not offer pick-ups around Wedmore, but there will be a pick-up in Theale. All passengers must arrive at the Lerburne car park in time for a prompt departure at 9.30 am. You will then be taken to the Park and Ride in Bath where the driver will go with you on the Park and Ride shuttle bus to the drop off point at the Shopping Centre.
