



Last month, I was honoured to join the families of those who died on board a Chinook helicopter which crashed in the Mull of Kintyre in June 1994, delivering a petition with over 51,500 signatures to 10 Downing Street. 31 years after this tragedy, the families, one of whom is local, still have no idea what happened. They're calling for the Defence Secretary to meet the families and release the documents (which have been locked away by the MoD and won't be released until the end of the century) and tell the truth about what happened that distressing day. Ministers are willing to talk to my colleagues and me, and I'll work flat out to make progress and bring justice to the families involved.

November is a more sombre month, with remembrance at its core. This year, Parliament marked 75 years since the House of Commons chamber was rebuilt, having been bombed during the Second World War. Our communities honour those who lost their lives, particularly in the Great War and the Second World War. Every year I wear both a red and a white poppy. The red poppy reminds us 'never forget' the loss of British military personnel and those allied forces who died alongside them. The white 'peace' poppy was first worn in 1933, to remember everyone who died, those who were physically and mentally injured, made homeless or stateless by war, and its plea is 'never again'. Civilians are victims of war too, as our daily news broadcasts constantly remind us.

It matters to me to hear what matters to you. If you have a concern, question or something you would like to bring to my attention, please do get in touch, or visit me at one of my 'surgeries'. I have listed some local dates below, but please contact my office for the full list. To keep updated on my work as your MP, I can also be found on Facebook and Instagram.

My next local surgery will be at the Bluebird Café in Wedmore on Saturday 13 December from 9.00am to 10.00am. All 'surgeries' operate on a first come, first served basis and no appointment is necessary. If you can't come to see me, I'll come to see you.

Wedmore Parish Clerk Update

Hello friends. As 2025 comes to an end, I've been reflecting on just how much goes into keeping Wedmore running. From the outside, it's easy to overlook what happens, but behind every clean public toilet, safe playground, new allotment or interment at the cemetery are hours of organisation, emails, quotes, and follow-up.

The Parish Council is responsible for a great deal: the public toilets, three playgrounds, Worthington Woods, the allotments, the village car park, and the cemetery. Each site brings its own set of issues, from maintenance and safety checks, to contracts, repairs, and complaints. Add to that insurance renewals, risk assessments, financial reports, planning consultations, and policies, and it becomes clear that

parish business never really stops. I'm contracted for 25 hours a week, but it could easily take ten times that to stay fully on top of everything. And, while I'm the only paid employee, your councillors are all volunteers and are not paid a penny for the hours they put in, yet they read reports, attend meetings, inspect sites, and deal with concerns because they care deeply about Wedmore and its people.

The Planning Committee has handled a high number of applications this year. It's important to be clear: the Parish Council is a consultee, not the decision-maker. We do not grant or refuse permission; that lies with Somerset Council. Our role is to review applications carefully, assess local impact, and ensure residents' views are represented. Councillors and members of the public must be able to take part in open discussion without fear, shouting, or personal attacks. There will always be public consultation, but it must take place in the right way, with respect on all sides.

The Finance Committee has been preparing the 2026/27 budget, an update on that will follow next month. The Environmental and Biodiversity Committee has delivered practical results: a new rowan tree for the cemetery pond, owl boxes for Terry's Wood, and the groundwork for a new Biodiversity Action Plan. The Community Resilience Committee has been focusing on winter preparedness, checking drains, reviewing emergency procedures, and linking with Somerset Village Agents to support residents who might need help. All of this happens quietly, without fanfare, so the rest of us can enjoy a village that works. As we approach Christmas, I'd ask everyone to take a moment to reflect, to be grateful for what we have, to look out for a neighbour or friend, and to remember that community spirit is built on small acts of kindness.

Green Wedmore is one of 232 local charities, social enterprises and voluntary groups to receive the prestigious award this year. The King's Award for Voluntary Service aims to recognise outstanding work by local volunteer groups to support their communities. Remembrance Sunday Service

St Mary's church was packed, as usual, for the Remembrance Sunday service on 9 November, including representatives of the various local scout and guide units. The most poignant moment of this service each year is the roll call of names, read by



Brigadier (Retd.) David Eccles, of those young men from across the Isle of Wedmore who gave their lives in the First and Second World Wars. Crosses with a name on are given to members of the congregation as they take their seats and they are asked to stand when that name is read out. Looking around the church, as the roll call progresses, gives you a real feel for the impact that these conflicts had on the Parish, remembering that its population was much smaller then.

Following the main service, the congregation, and a parade of serving and exservice personnel, regrouped in the churchyard to lay wreaths and the crosses with the names of the dead. David then made a further roll call, which is sadly growing each year, of the names of those service personnel with links to the area who have made the ultimate sacrifice since the end of the Second World War.

The Parish Council have already approved five new road entry signs depicting King Alfred and his peace treaty here in 878AD. This treaty was agreed, but never actually signed. However, a twelve-day Party resulted!

The major project for the Group is to have a six-foot bronze statue of King Alfred erected in the Churchyard. This will make an important statement for posterity and valuable educational value. The cost of this project is circa £125k, which is formidable but achievable with the help of the Heritage Lottery Fund. Concerted fund raising is due to begin shortly and we are pleased to say that we have the full support of Somerset Council in this endeavour.

Wedmore and Axbridge Community Health Fund

The Health Fund would like to inform all patients of the Axbridge and Wedmore Medical Practice that they have agreed to donate £100,000 to the Practice for the reconfiguration of both surgeries to form additional clinical rooms.

The Project has resulted from a government investment of £102m, to be spread over more than 1,000 selected practices nationwide, for improvements to their existing buildings. The NHS government stipulation is that the project must be completed by March 2026. Both Axbridge and Wedmore surgeries received grants but, unfortunately, Wedmore was £42,000 short of the total required for the work. The Fund will, therefore, be donating the £42,000 plus £33,000 for the equipping of each reconfigured clinical room. A sum of £5,000 has been set aside for hitherto unforeseen costs at Wedmore. As Axbridge is to lose storage space to enable the provision of additional medical facilities, £24,000 is being donated for the creation of a clinical room and a new storage space. The Fund Trustees are delighted to be able to invest in this Project which will benefit all patients of the Axbridge and Wedmore Medical Practice.

The Health Fund was founded in 1988 by Mrs Muriel Welch, a Wedmore parish councillor, to provide equipment and services for the Axbridge and Wedmore Medical Practice and for individual patients. The fund provides financial assistance to numerous groups within the community, all of which provide much needed support for various health needs. The Fund also supports Weston Hospicecare as many patients from Axbridge and Wedmore Medical Practice come under their care and with restricted bed numbers, only 10, many are cared for in their own homes.

The Fund Trustees are so pleased that, thanks to the Wedmore Ambulance Trust bequest of £382,000 we can support this project. Historically, these funds were to be used for the building of a new surgery in Wedmore. Many of the curious have found their way to Wedmore Village Farm on Plud Street (at the end of Kelson's Lane opposite the Post and Wicket), or have attended one of the events we have held over the year, such as the amazing Midsummer Night's



Dream we hosted for Wedmore Theatre Group, our Kid's Festival in May, or our most recent Pumpkins, Petals, and Pizza day.

Whilst summer may be fading away, we are still busying away at the farm, organising events, hosting volunteers, and delivering educational sessions for children and young adults. Our seasonal vegetables continue to go out to members of our 'veg box' scheme and will run until the end of December before a break, resuming in Spring 2026. Income from our veg boxes, flowers, and events supports our charitable work helping those experiencing food insecurity by growing fresh, seasonal produce for food banks and educating children about environmental stewardship. Contact vegbox@ wedmorevillagefarm.co.uk if you would like to If you would like to find out about volunteering, or to sign up for this season or next.

In October, we were pleased that we had exceeded last year's target of delivering 11,000 portions of vegetables to the local Food Banks, including Cheddar Valley, Shepton Mallet, Wells and Highbridge Food Pantry. In addition, we have supported St Ben's and St John's schools in Glastonbury.

A little-known activity of the farm is that we deliver a weekly bespoke educational session for primary school students, focusing on growing food, connecting with nature, and learning about the food system. We have helped develop disused areas of the school into productive vegetable beds, which as well as planting soft fruits. These sessions resumed during the autumn term at St Ben's School in Glastonbury.

The flowers have been providing much colour to the farm, as those of you who have ventured up the track for 'pick your own' flowers will agree. Although people are welcome to PYO at any time (we have an honesty box or QR code to facilitate payments), we held a specific PYO afternoon in October when the morning rain

didn't deter people, and they came up for flowers, tea, cake, and a chat. We have been making new friends when we sell flowers at Glastonbury market on Tuesdays. The fresh flower season is now coming to an end, but we will be back with dry and fresh wreaths for Xmas

As we look forward, we are busy planning for our Christmas Market on Saturday, 6 December, 11.00am to 4.00pm. Come along for festive stalls, live music, food, workshops, and seasonal cheer. To help with planning, please get your free ticket from Eventbrite 'Wedmore Village Farm Market'

than spending money on finding and repairing the leak, in what was an ageing system, we chose to replace the whole system with carbon-friendly air-source heat pumps.

During the last year we have also made extensive repairs to parts of the main roof, which involved replacing rotten wooden battens and lead flashing. We also re-tiled the leaking roof over the entrance porch. Additionally, many of the crumbling stones on the plinth around the outside of the hall have had to be replaced. An upgrade to the fire alarm system was also completed to bring it into line with new minimum standards. All these on top of the regular statutory health and safety inspections and servicing costs, including fire extinguishers, fire alarms, gas safety, and pest control. Not to mention the general running costs for insurance, cleaning, and utilities.

The raked seating, mechanical ventilation, and upgraded snug all continue to be assets to the hall and are welcome and well used.

Looking forward, we are shortly to replace the main kitchen range that is well past its use-by date and new parts are no longer available. A generous donation from Wedmore Real Ale Festival has helped us fund this project. Once we remove the old gas boilers and radiators throughout the hall we will start a redecoration programme. The main hall fluorescent ceiling lights are also to be replaced with higher efficiency LED bulbs.

With so many new houses and new families being welcomed to Wedmore we would love to hear from any of them who would be able to contribute to the all-important work of the Management Committee of the Hall. 



We have a new Wedmore Community Bus! Thanks to Somerset County Council we have replaced of 10-year-old bus for a newer, more comfortable, and ecofriendly version. Smaller, the new bus can be driven by anyone with a normal car licence which will help with recruiting and retaining our friendly volunteer drivers.

The Wedmore Community Bus team is offering a new regular monthly bus service to Wells. Initially as a trial, this will run on the second Saturday of every month, to coincide with the regular Saturday market. The route will be via Theale and Godney, with pick-ups and dropoffs available around Wedmore and en route. for those who need them.

The dates for the first three months are 10 January, 14 February,

and 14 March. The service will leave Wedmore Car Park at 9.30am and drop off at the Market Place and the Bus Station. The return trip will leave the Bus Station at 12.15, picking up at the Market Place around 12.20, and returning to Wedmore by about 12.45. This is a trial, so your feedback will be important and future journey timings may be adjusted accordingly.

As with all our services, fares are kept low as the bus is financed by Somerset Council, and all our drivers are volunteers. The service is free for everyone with a

concessionary Bus Pass, except for the Bath and Cribbs Causeway services which are £2 for concessions. All services are free for children under 5 years old. For other adults, this service will be £3 for the return journey.



Book Review: 'First in Line' by Judith Rose

Judith Rose is known to and well loved by many in our local area. A local girl, she went on to play an important part in a crucial moment in the life of The Church of England and became the first woman to hold a senior post in the Church. Now she has written an illuminating and very readable memoir that takes the reader from the Wedmore Young Farmers Show to crucial discussions in General Synod and to Rochester cathedral.

Judith moved to live in Wedmore when she was two years old and grew up in Cocklake. She went to Wedmore primary school and Sexey's at Blackford, when it was a grammar school, cycling the three miles each way via Crickham and Stoughton. She belonged to Wedmore Brownies, Guides and Young Farmers Club and attended St Mary's church. After leaving school she farmed in the area. When she was 21, she left the village to work in Cornwall.



In her mid-20's Judith felt the call of God to serve as a Lay Minister in the Church of England. This was long before it was possible for women to be ordained. In 1966, after two years theological training, she served in parishes in Swindon, Leeds, Bradford, and in Kent. During this time there was discussion and many debates about whether women should be ordained. Judith was involved in those issues as a member of General Synod, the Church of England's governing body, and was present when the decisive vote was taken to allow women to be ordained. She was among the first women to be ordained in 1994.

Two years later Judith was appointed as Archdeacon in the Diocese of Rochester, the first woman to hold such a post in the Church of England and for three years was the only woman Archdeacon. Before retiring Judith initiated a debate about the appointment of women as Bishops, so had a small part to play in a journey which has now led to the appointment of the first woman Archbishop of Canterbury.

Judith has returned to the area and now lives in Cheddar. The book entitled 'First in Line' is published by Kev-in Mayhew. It is available from the publishers or from Wells Cathedral Shop. If you would like a personally signed copy, please contact Judith at rose.gwyer@btinternet.com.

I wonder if you will come across an angel today? Not the versions that we see on our Christmas cards and in stained glass windows, those winged and otherworldly communicators of beauty and truth, that would be news indeed and probably very scary; but a real live angel, flesh and blood.

What the word angel means is simply 'messenger'. In the bible, angels are often depicted as those who carry God's message to mortals. This Month in the Garden

Better sweep the chimney early this month to make Santa's downward slide a little easier (and cleaner) complete with Christmas parcels! Also buy supplies of carrots for his reindeers. Christmas lights will need checking as there's usually one or two bulbs needing replacing, and it's time to decide on a Christmas tree. The best ones are rooted trees in pots, and increasingly available nowadays, but everyone has their own preferences. There is a wider choice these days with pines and Abies along with the traditional Norway Spruce, and scent is an added bonus from the more modern trees. If you take care, rooted trees can be planted in the garden after Christmas and, if given a feed, will often regrow and be suitable for lifting and repotting next year. Alternatively, just leave it in the pot and keep watering and feeding well, ready for next year's display.

Thinking about a small Christmas project, why not create a display of succulents and small alpines. This would make a lovely feature for the festive table and a unique talking point for your guests. The local garden centre has many including sempervivums and sedums. A spoonful of gravel topping will keep everything clean and tidy. Thinking of plants for Christmas, a scarlet poinsettia is a necessity these days, and very cost effective, just take care to avoid contact with the white sap should any leaves break off. Other house plant choices include azaleas and kalanchoe, both available in a range of colours. Oh, and I nearly forgot the Christmas cactus (Schlumbergera) in pink, white or red. This succulent plant is really a succulent, rather than a cactus, so it has no nasty thorns! It will need to be kept at a normal room temperature of 18 to 20C and given an occasional water spray, just to keep the humidity up. Don't forget to find those pots and bowls of hyacinth bulbs, it's time to bring them out into the light, as the roots will have developed now and it's time for the flower stems to develop. A cool spot is best, but light is the important requirement.

This is still the ideal time for planting new trees, shrubs, and even tulip bulbs, which may be reduced in price now but will be fine for planting early in December. Also remember that bare root hedging plants and roses are actually better planted now as the soil is still warm and moist. Don't forget the bird feed and check that your winter pots and tubs are all raised an inch or two to allow rain drainage, so your plants do not get waterlogged. Collect the last of the tree leaves to make that fantastic leaf mould to create your own high quality potting compost and, on a fine day, do a little pruning to keep shrubs looking neat and tidy.

The vegetable garden is still yielding plenty of produce, so de-leaf the brussels sprouts and review the winter cabbage, kale, carrots, parsnips and beetroot availability for the Christmas season. It's not too early to think about covering a rhubarb plant with an upturned tub which will force it into early growth for a tender treat in March. Whilst you do this why not lift and divide your spreading rhubarb plant? You can leave the root on the soil surface for a few weeks without harm before breaking the clump and replanting the roots into newly enriched soil.

This month the winter solstice on the 21 December marks the shortest day of the year, when many cultures celebrated the rebirth of the sun. Traditionally known as 'Yule', this term was recorded in Britain by the English monk Bede. Thus the church adopted this, and 25 December became the day of Christ's birth, and the ensuing days became twelve days of Christmas, ending with the visit to the crib of the Magi. So, models of the Magi should not appear at the crib until then (oops! – Ed). The traditional 'Yule' was a piece of oak or ash, lit on Christmas Day to protect the home from fire damage but, being 'chocolate people', we have now reimagined this as the delicious Christmas log cake.

Wishing you all a truly delicious, joyful and happy Christmas!



Wedmore Footpaths Group Successes in 2025

Wedmore Footpaths Group was formed when Women of Wedmore walkers found many of the paths around the village were difficult to find because of overgrown paths, fallen tree branches, and missing signage, plus many stiles were in urgent need of repair. Naively the group thought it could fix things but soon realised it would be a bit more complicated; lots of bureaucracy ensued with form filling, building relationships, research into land ownership, and logging faults. Despite all the challenges, the group has many successes to share with the Wedmore community.

The group's achievements include: Two of the Six 'Walks Around Wedmore' (Walks 1 and 4) have been updated, re-written, published, and most problems along the routes fixed. Work is well underway on updating and fixing problems on the remaining four walks. You can find the updates to the walking guide on the Isle of Wedmore website and on the village notice boards. All volunteers are now insured. Many landowners are known and are being very helpful and supportive with the upgrades to the footpath network. The group has worked through legislation and regulations to identify where responsibility lies, and the standards required for replacements and repairs to signage, stiles and gates. The Men's Shed is working with the group to carry out work along the paths supported by established repair teams from local Ramblers groups.

The Wedmore Footpaths Group is extremely grateful for funding contributions from Wedmore Community Power, Wedmore Beer Festival, and Women of Wedmore.

We hope to see you out on the paths around the village; there's some wonderful scenery to enjoy! Thinking ahead to next year the group is exploring ideas for a Walking Festival. 

Cheddar and Wedmore Bridge Club

Notable scores of 65% or more were achieved in October club sessions by Gary Langdale and Ray Harper 70%, Barbara Biggin and Gillian Toogood 69.8%, Brian Ladd and Chris Loughlin 67.5%, Geoff Davies and Paul St Quintin 67.5%, Jennifer Panayiotou and Marilyn Dykes 67.5%, Janice Young and Marilyn Dykes 66.7%, John Moore and Pam Prentice 66%, Brian Crosby and Mike Smith 65% and Derek Essen and Maria Constantinidou 65%.

The month has been a month of big hands. I actually bid and made 7NT twice on the same day but, in the hand below, no pair bid the laydown 7 spades. It demonstrates why you should play Key Card Blackwood (or Roman Key Card Blackwood) where you count your aces and the king of trumps in your response to 4NT and do not count it in your response to 5NT king ask. After East opens one spade West is immediately thinking about a slam but they don't have the king of spades. Playing Blackwood you can only determine that partner has one ace and two kings (using 5NT). You could be missing the king of trumps! Playing Key Card Blackwood, you know immediately after your 4NT bid that partner has one ace plus the king of trumps and you should consider a grand slam.



With no opposition bidding, we bid 1S - 2NT - 4S - 4NT - 5H. Playing five card majors, 1S is 5 cards or more, 2NT is Jacoby agreeing spades and forcing to game. My 4S showed a minimum opener <15 points with no singleton or void and 5H showed two key cards which must be the ace of clubs and the king of spades. Seeing only nine immediate tricks, and with me having shown a minimum hand, partner settled for bidding the small slam.

Playing 5-card majors, however, partner can work out that I have two doubletons. With 5332 shape I would have opened 1NT, with 12 to 14 points, and passed with fewer. With no singleton or void I must be 5422, 6322 or the

unlikely 7222. If one of these doubletons is hearts, then we have two ruffs and if I have two kings (only 13 points) we have 13 tricks. Bidding 5NT to ask for kings costs nothing but more importantly, it involves West in the decision since it guarantees to partner that all key cards are held which may allow them to bid the grand slam. In this case, with only one extra king shown, Jack, my bridge playing program bids 7 spades, even if East only bid 6 spades. West now knows that East is considering a grand slam

and, with an absolute maximum for his bidding so far, could press on to bid the grand slam, confident that there are no missing key cards.

Isle of Wedmore Society

Our October meeting attracted a wide audience of members and visitors all with an interest in railways, especially our local Wells Railways which have, sadly, now gone. Our speaker was the most enthusiastic Colin Price from the Wells Railway Fraternity, a thriving club you may wish to join. Colin's detailed knowledge and extensive collection of original photographs of The Railways of Wells kept us enthralled for over an hour.



The railways in question were planned and built in the mid-19th century, when railway mania took over following the opening of the historic Manchester to Liverpool line. Money was invested and money made. An Act of Parliament was required before any proposal was given permission, but once that was in place literally full steam ahead. Colin had maps showing the planning of routes which took little account of existing farms, buildings or homes. Anything deemed in the way, went. The only time the line was re-drawn was if the new railway threatened to come too close to the investors' large houses!

He told us about the three local lines, now all gone, which connected Wells to Frome, Yatton and Highbridge and all built by different companies. The Somerset Central, later to be The Somerset and Dorset line, ran from Highbridge into Wells via Glastonbury. The East Somerset Railway ran from Frome via Shepton Mallet into Wells. And the Cheddar Valley Line went from Yatton into Wells and became well known as The Strawberry Line. All three lines terminated in Wells around a re-developed Priory Street, each with their own stations but within walking distance of each other, (think Lidl, Tincknell and the Tucker Street Vet's in today's world) before all the lines were taken over by The Great Western Railway and linked, then finally closed.

Colin was able to 'take us down all the lines' using his fantastic collection of photos to show us the original stations and engine houses which had been so carefully built and maintained but have now mostly disappeared. Some of these stations have been retained and restored, Cranmore is a beautiful case in point and the Sandford and Banwell Station is well worth a visit. Yatton and Highbridge are still there, of course, in use on the mainlines. The rest are gone or nearly gone. Axbridge Station could be used, but the pretty Congresbury Station is derelict, and is completely covered in undergrowth, like a Sleeping Beauty castle. Many well-crafted stone bridges remain over what are now cycle tracks and footpaths as reminders of what was once a thriving network taking coal, stone, strawberries, and passengers out of Somerset to other areas of Britain and beyond. How about a day trip to Cherbourg for a mere 7s/6d? (£120 in today's money). Possible by train, apparently, in 1865.

At our November meeting the members enjoyed wine and mince pies as a pre-Christmas treat and we now break until 29 January for our AGM and a talk by a club member, Paul Roberts, on the Finger Posts Around Wedmore. Small, but fascinating and useful objects. Please note that this meeting falls on the 5th Thursday in January not our usual 4th.



Wedmore Community Bus

Good News! From January we will be trialling a new regular monthly bus service to Wells. It will be a 'Market Day Special' running on the second Saturday of each month.



The Community Bus is a not-for-profit bus service run by volunteers for the benefit of the local community. It

currently provides regular weekly scheduled services to four locations and monthly services to Bath and Cribbs Causeway. The bus is also available for private hire, principally for the use of local community groups.

The bus is a friendly place and open to everyone. Our drivers want to help you enjoy your time on the bus as much as possible. Except for the Bath service, we try to pick-up and drop-off at a location that is convenient to you, including your home if need this. We are also flexible about drop-offs en-route. We are happy to provide help in getting on and off the bus for those who need it.

Fares are kept low, as the bus is financed by Somerset Council and all our drivers are volunteers. The service is free for everyone with a concessionary Bus Pass, except for the Bath and Cribbs Causeway services which are £2 for concessions. All services are free for children under 5 years old.

Except for the Bath service, passenger pick-ups and drop-offs are normally available in Wedmore, Sand, Heath House, Mudgley, Latcham, and Cocklake, with additional pick-ups and drop-offs in other villages en route to each destination if requested. Please request a pick-up location when you book, and we will try to accommodate. Note that the Bath Service only picks up at Wedmore Car Park and Theale.

Private Hire

When it is not committed to the above scheduled services, the Community Bus is available for private hire for day trips and evenings.

Our drivers are fully trained, and they volunteer to provide this local service. Each enquiry will be provided with a list of drivers to contact. If you are a community group and wish to make regular use of the service then we can train one of your members, so you always have a driver available.

The bus safely seats 16 people and will cost £2 per mile (plus a discretionary tip for the volunteer driver!). There is a discounted rate of £1 per mile for youth and children's community groups and for adult community groups who have their own driver approved by Somerset Council. 
